From Our President

Welcome to the 2014-15 school year. I hope that you enjoyed your summer and that school started smoothly this year.

I would like to personally welcome our new ECEs and EAs. As of September, our Bargaining Unit has grown to more than 1200 members. Full day kindergarten is now in all elementary schools across the province. Due to the Extended Day Program, we have the largest number of ECE members within OSSTF.

For those of you who are new this year to the OCDSB, you are a member of the Student Support Professionals Bargaining Unit (SSP). Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation (OSSTF) is our Union and we are one of the seven bargaining units in District 25. The TBU (teachers), OT (occasional secondary teachers), ESP (office, clerical and technical), PSSP (psychologists, social workers, speech pathologists), PSSU (custodial, maintenance), PECCS (ESL instructors and child care minders) and of course the SSP (EAs and ECEs).

Thank you to everyone who took the time out of their busy schedules to attend the District Meeting or to vote at our office. I am proud to say that our Bargaining Unit had the largest turn out. This upcoming year is likely to be challenging for all of us. As Bill 122 is implemented and the negotiation process begins, we will all need to stand together and support one another.

Our Collective Bargaining team led by our Chief Negotiator, Jean Trant, will strive to negotiate the best local agreement possible. If you have suggestions or are interested in serving on this committee, please contact Jean directly.

On a daily basis, we hear from our members regarding the lack of Casual Replacements. HR is trying to hire more ECEs and EAs, but there doesn't ever seem to be enough. This is an ongoing issue that is discussed regularly at Labour Management meetings with the Board. Easy Connect is the call-out system our Board uses. We would like to hear from our Casuals as to the effectiveness of Easy Connect.

There seems to be an increase in the number of diabetic students in our schools. If you are working with a diabetic student, you must be trained by a Health Care Professional prior to being involved in blood sugar testing, or any other procedure involving an insulin pump. We are not allowed to give insulin injections.

With full day kindergarten, toileting has become an issue. Both the EA and ECE job description includes it as a job task. In the event that a kinder student requires assistance, it is the ECE's responsibility unless an EA is assigned to that particular student during the day. EAs cannot be called from their regular assignments to toilet a kinder. If a student (not Spec Ed) is not toilet trained or has accidents on a frequent basis, there should be a meeting with the ECE, teacher, Principal and parents to discuss the issue.

If you have any questions or concerns or if something just doesn't "seem right", please give Jean Trant or myself a call. We are also willing to come to your school to answer your questions and concerns.

Update from our Chief Negotiator

As we begin a new year we are very much aware that there are changes happening and not all of them seasonal

We are having a **two tier** bargaining this round as Bill 122 established a new process. The first round is done **centrally** and the provincial team will be bargaining for all support staff in the province on issues that will for the most part have a financial impact. These usually include pay increases, benefits and maternity.

Once the central table issues have been decided upon we can then start our **local** negotiations. Here we will be bargaining for things that are of issue to us locally. If anyone has anything that they would like to see put into the brief please let me know and our CBC will set up a time for you to come to present to us.

I am pleased to announce that we have a full Collective Bargaining Committee. It is made up of EAs from both secondary and elementary schools, IEAs and ECEs from core and the Extended Day Program.

Thank you to all who have agreed to be a SSP site representative. You are very valuable to Cheryl and I and we really appreciate you taking on this valuable job. Your help in keeping us in the loop as to the SSP movement in your worksite helps tremendously. We have just finished 3 evenings of training, one here at the office, one at Metcalfe PS and at Fallingbrook Community ES. Thanks again to all who came out to hear what is expected and to get informed on where we are in the bargaining situation.

There are some things that the SSP members should keep in mind:

The home based email addresses you provided will be used as we progress into negotiations in the early winter. Some providers will not accept bulk mail so if you could add <u>jean.trant@d25.osstf.ca</u> to your contact lists it would be most appreciated. This will save the bounce backs and me from having to figure out who's not receiving the notices from the Province.

Reminder: Hours of Work

EAs- 7 hours plus a 40 minute unpaid lunch plus 2 fifteen minute breaks

ECEs-7 hours plus a 30 minute unpaid lunch plus 2 fifteen minute breaks

or

3.5 hours plus 15 minute break

Terms and Casuals are also expected to work these hours.

A maximum of 44 hours per week can be worked. Please consider this if you are asked or wish to work extra shifts in the EDP.







My name is Christine Rowe and I have been an EA for 25 years. I currently work at A. Lorne Cassidy E.S. in Stittsville.

Last year, in December 2013 I attended a one-day workshop to learn about "Together Fairness Works" and to become a first "engager" for TFW.

Together Fairness Works is the catch phrase being used by the Canadian Labour Congress for the initiative that they have undertaken to promote positive feelings and interactions with unions and their members. The CLC uses the phrase Together Fairness Works because most Canadians believe that fairness is good and that unions, in general are good and promote fairness.

You may already have seen the commercials that the CLC has put out to promote the ideas. It's the one with the little popsicles that people are holding up with messages printed on them. Some of the messages in this series of commercials are: Support a Safe Workplace, Parental Leave is Fair, Support Decent Pensions, Vacation Time is Fair, and Diversity is Fair.
